Food and beverage cartons contain high-quality fiber which, when recycled, is used to make new products, contributing to a circular economy. There are two types of cartons: aseptic and gable top. Aseptic cartons are shelf-stable and are often used to store products like broth, soups, juices or milk for long periods without the need for preservatives or refrigeration. Gable top cartons require refrigeration and are often considered the traditional milk carton.
